Exact 14 yrs: Civic officer acquitted in bribe case

Exactly 14 years after he was arrested by the Thane unit of the Anti-Corruption Bureau (ACB) for his alleged involvement in demanding a bribe of Rs50,000 to save a dilapidated building from being demolished in Mira Road, the ward officer Sanjay Dondre was recently acquitted by a lower court in Thane. However, the complainant had passed away even before his evidence could be recorded.

However, the ACB is preparing to challenge the decision in the high court. The incident dates back to August 12, 2010, when the ACB team in response to a complaint filed by Sudhakar Jadhav (on behalf of the construction company) arrested Dondre.

The civic administration had issued the sanction order dated June 22, 2011, as required under section 19(1)(c) of Prevention of Corruption Act 1988, against the accused. After the probe, a charge-sheet was submitted in the court. While the complainant died before his evidence could be recorded during the court proceeding, the panch witness in his deposition admitted that he was not present in the cabin and hence could not confirm what had transpired between the officer and the complainant. Moreover, forensic analysis could not confirm the voice sample of the accused – a vital piece of evidence – with the alleged recording of the verification demand and accordingly a negative report was given. It was also noted that the sanction was granted without application of mind in which it is not written that voice belongs to the accused. In the call voice played in the court, there was no sound and the court could not hear the voice from the other end on account of distortion.

'Ex-dir played key role in tragedy'

The prosecution has opposed the bail plea of Janhvi Marathe, former director of Ego Media Pvt Ltd, which constructed the hoarding that collapsed in Ghatkopar in May, arguing that she played a crucial role in the incident. The crash resulted in the killing of 17 people. According to the prosecution, Marathe, as the compa-

ny's director, signed all relevant documents along with Bhavesh Bhide. In 2020, both Marathe and Bhide participated in a tender for the construction of a hoarding in Ghatkopar East, issued by the Railway Police Commissionerate, Mumbai. The tender specified that obtaining permission from the BMC was mandatory.

The prosecution asserts that Marathe was fully aware of this requirement, as she signed the agreement, acknowledging the terms and conditions of the tender. Despite this, the prosecution

alleges that Marathe, in collusion with other accused persons and officials from the BMC and Railway Police Commissionerate, proceeded to erect the hoarding near the BPCL petrol pump without the necessary permissions. Marathe, however,

denies any involvement and has blamed Bhide for the collapse. The prosecution is also investigating the role of Arshad Khan, a business partner of the suspended IPS officer and additional director general of police, Quaiser Khalid's wife. Khan is accused of acting as an agent to secure the permission needed to erect the hoarding. The prosecution claims that a large sum of money was deposited in Khan's account, with allegations that he received over Rs1 crore for obtaining the required permissions.

Advisory for SpiceJet halt withdrawn

An hour after the Mumbai International Airport Ltd (MIAL) put out the advisory on X stating that the SpiceJet's operations are expected to be disrupted from midnight of August 13, the airport withdrew the advisory. The post was deleted and soon after SpiceJet issued a statement saying the airline and MIAL worked to swiftly resolve a minor financial matter. Specific details were not disclosed. The Gurugram-based airline has been facing liquidity issues for many quarters and has been delaying salaries to its employees besides defaulting on statutory taxes and payments, among others. The airport operator also said it is working to address the situation.

MU, ICT slip, IIT-B, TISS make gains

The University of Mumbai (MU) has lost its spot among the top 100 higher education institutes in the country and has been placed in 101-150 ranking band in the latest edition of the National Institutional Ranking Framework (NIRF). IIT-Madras, AIIMS and Jawaharlal Nehru University stayed on top of the charts.

MU has also slipped from last year's 56th position to 61st place in the university category of NIRF 2024, which was released by the Union Ministry of Education. Introduced in 2015, NIRF seeks to rank Indian institutes on a number of parameters including 'Teaching, Learning and Resources,' 'Research and Professional Practices,' 'Graduation Outcomes,' 'Outreach and Inclusivity,' and 'Perception.'

The Indian Institute of Technology Bombay (IIT-B) continues to be the highest-ranked institute in the city, having climbed from fourth to third position

in the overall list. Meanwhile, the Tata Institute of Social Sciences (TISS), which was brought under the control of the central government, which was earlier in 150-200 ranking range, has found a place among the top 100 with 98th rank.

The Homi Bhabha National Institute, a higher education institute run by the Ministry of Atomic Energy in the city, has also fared better compared to last year. The institute has been placed at 27th rank in the overall list, up from 30. Among universities, it ranks 16th, a place better than last year. However, the Institute of Chemical Technology (ICT) has performed relatively poorly compared to 2023. The premier institute dropped from 41st to 56th position in the overall list and 23rd to 35th in the varsity list. The Narsee Monjee Institute of Management Studies (NMIMS), the only private city varsity in the top 100 list, has slipped a few notches in both the overall and university rankings.

GREEN SPACE PRESERVATION | South Mumbai residents express concerns; environmental activists write to BMC chief

Activists push back on Coastal Road hoardings

In reaction to widespread concerns from south Mumbai residents about the proposed installation of hoardings on the coastal road, environmental activists Zoru Bhatena and Stalin D have voiced their objections. They have sent a letter to the municipal commissioner, urging adherence to existing laws and Supreme Court directives, and requesting the suspension of any plans to install hoardings along the coastal road.

Bhatena said, "The entire Coastal Road is envisioned as a green, public space, intended to remain free from commercial exploitation. The BMC has neither applied for nor been granted permission to install any hoardings or commercial signboards along the road. Furthermore, the Supreme Court's 2019 order, which



restrains the BMC from undertaking any development work in this area, remains in effect." The letter, also signed by Stalin D, Director of Vanshakti, added, "According to the Coastal Regulation Zone (CRZ) rules, reclaimed land can only be used for public purposes, and commercial exploitation is not permitted. We urge the BMC to respect the apex

court's restraining orders and adhere to the prohibitions outlined under the CRZ Regulations."

The online petition launched by Rajesh Dahiya, a member of the Breach Candy Residents Forum and chairman of a housing society has garnered over 6,000 signatures in less than a week. A civic official said, "No hoardings have been

proposed for the reclaimed land. However, four hoardings approved for the Tata Garden land are affected because the area falls within Coastal Regulation Zone-2. The company awarded the 10-year contract will need to await approval from the Maharashtra Coastal Zone Management Authority. Meanwhile, Shiv Sena (UBT) MLA Aaditya Thackeray has demanded the cancellation of the contract.

Protest over 'misuse' of reserved plot

Chandivali's L Ward residents on Sunday morning protested against unauthorised construction on a plot reserved for public amenities. The plot, adjacent to the Woodland Heights Co-operative Housing Society on Chandivali Farm Road, was reportedly handed to the BMC by the developer for community use. Residents claim the land is being misappropriated, raising concerns about political encroachment.

Mandeep Singh Makkar, founder of the Chandivali Citizens Welfare Association, said, "We have witnessed numerous instances of public spaces being grossly misused in this area. The BMC was supposed to develop something that the community needs, but with the absence of an elected municipal body, BMC officers are acting with impunity. They have begun erecting iron structures without any consultation or trans-



parency. This is nothing short of land grabbing."

Makkar noted the need for recreational spaces, pointing out that Woodland Heights, home to 133 families, lacks gardens or open spaces. "This land could be transformed into a much-needed garden for senior citizens, a playground for children, or even a public library. Instead, BMC officers are making unilateral decisions without accountability. If our local MLA has

decided what will be built here, why weren't we, the residents, consulted?" Makkar questioned.

The situation escalated when residents discovered that the MLA conducted a Pooja ceremony followed by construction by workers who, according to residents, are not official contractors. "We suspected encroachment when the work began. We fear that this space will be co-opted by political workers under the

guise of public welfare, but in reality, it will be locked away, accessible only to them. Taxpayers' money will be used to build something that the public cannot use," Makkar added.

Devendra Jain, Chairman of Woodland Heights, said, "We approached the local MLA for help, but when that failed, we had no choice but to protest. Our demand is simple: BMC must involve the residents in decision-making processes. Any development on this plot should benefit the community, not just serve political interests. A small garden could serve as a jogging area in the morning and evening, and a safe place for children to play. We need assurances that this space won't be hijacked for political activities."

Assistant Commissioner of L Ward, Dhanaji Herlerkar, said, "This plot is designated exclusively for an amenity, and nothing else can be constructed here."
